

Hi BAC Members,

I would like to update you as to how the Benalla Auto Club (BAC) has navigated the challenges that COVID-19 presented our businesses throughout 2020.

The restrictions and border closures put in place by various Governments had a profound effect on our ability to generate revenue through our core activities, with major events having been postponed or cancelled, testing stopped and rules around non-essential activities halted almost all other activities.

All our businesses were affected, but with the harsh restrictions in Victoria running for so much longer than in other states, it was Winton Motor Raceway which was the hardest hit. The NSW border closure and the metro-regional travel restrictions meant that a massive part of the Winton customer base was unable to attend the venue. Our tradition Friday test and tune days were cancelled for months and there were very few opportunities for revenue. Thankfully when restrictions eased, we were able to hold "regional" test and tune days and then return to our normal days from November, which allowed Winton to generate some much need revenue before the end of the year.

With NSW returning to close to normal activities mid- year, Wakefield Park was able to rebound strongly and performed very well in the second half of 2020, the ride and track days and several race meetings all generating strong revenues for Wakefield Park.

The AASA, with its national footprint was mainly affected in Victoria, with all the other states returning to motoring activities from June 2020, the meant that the AASA was able to recover well from the activities closure due to COVID-19 and finish off 2020 strongly with many new event opportunities to explore.

The AMRS was able to host three essentially state based race meetings at Sydney Motorsport Park, Queensland Raceway and Sandown, two of those venues having never hosted an AASA permitted event before. The competitors were very appreciative of the efforts we went to, to host the meetings for them as it gave them a distraction from the challenges of 2020 and COVID-19.

Throughout 2020 the Board and the management teams at the BAC, Winton, Wakefield, AASA and AMRS have worked tirelessly to protect our businesses for the future. We cannot underestimate how important the assistance from the various Federal and State Government incentives, including JobKeeper and Cash Flow Boost have been in ensuring the viability of our businesses throughout 2020. As a result of these combined efforts, the club has been able to absorb the challenge of a global pandemic with minimal long-term impact.

However as recent events have highlighted, we are not through this yet, as 2021 began with more border closures and the fear of another wave of infections. 2021 will continue to be a bumpy ride for everyone.

I am very pleased and proud of the way the Committee and management team worked together throughout 2020 to ensure the viability and future of our club. The results show we have navigated these unprecedented times well and I look forward to returning to a much more "normal" year in 2021.

#### 4. President's Report for year ended 2019

Welcome Benalla Auto Club members to our post COVID lockdown postponed AGM, the 62nd AGM for our club.

2019 was a challenging year for the club with management changes at Winton Raceway, ongoing issues with planning compliance at Wakefield Park and the challenges of promoting a national motor racing series. On the positive side our accounting and reporting restructure from 2016 continues to show benefits. Pleasingly our membership numbers remained stable after the changes made to the membership structure and now we believe we have members in the club for the right reasons.

Wakefield Park began to flourish under the management of Dean Chapman, with customer feedback and financial performance improving throughout the year.

2019 was the most successful Supercars Supersprint that Winton has hosted in recent memory. We continue to focus on our strengths, being a regional venue and a circuit that offers great spectator viewing, close competitive racing and the ability to camp on site.

The AASA continued its growth and increase in profile. Business Development Manager Ste phen Whyte working tirelessly to secure existing events and secure new events and disciplines across the country.

Benalla Auto Club AGM Minutes continued:

The small team at the AASA made further improvements to our online presence.

2019 saw the re-introduction of the Australian Motor racing Series, run by the BAC. Initially managed by Keven Stoopman and then Matt Baragwanath, AMRS had a challenging year and is yet to make a profit but was in it 2 year of a 3 year plan supported by Committee. Highlights were the first event at The Bend Motorsport Park and being able to provide TA2 a national platform for their race activities.

The BAC sub-committees, the Social Committee, the Executive Management Committee and the Sporting Committee, cemented their positions as the most effective way for the BAC Committee to oversee all the activities around the club. # 2020 Season Review



AUSTRALIAN AUTO-SPORT ALLIANCE

The 2020 season has been one of the most challenging ever faced by the Australian motorsport industry. The obstacles presented by the COVID-19 pandemic, includ-

ing state border closures, social distancing restrictions and

limits on the maximum numbers of people able to attend



events, significantly increased the burden on event staff, volunteers and the racers themselves.



Despite the obstacles, the AASA was proud to play its part in sustaining the industry by sanctioning a variety of events across multiple disciplines including circuit racing, off-road and tarmac rally.

The fact these events were able to go ahead was down to the sheer determination of passionate enthusiasts, including hard-working event

promoters, dedicated officials and competitors who overcame numerous hurdles to get back ontrack.

After motorsport activities ground virtually to a standstill in mid-March, the AASA sanctioned the MRA

(Motor Racing Australia) "(OVID-Comeback" race meeting on 13 June. The event featured popular NSW categories including Super TT, Pulsars, Mazda MX5/RX8 Cup and Series X3 NSW (Exc els). In a demonstration of the raw enthusiasm of drivers to go racing again, the one-hour Excel endurance race even attracted Super-



cars stars Anton De Pasquale, Brodie Kostecki and Broe Feeney, with Triple 8 boss Roland Dane on the ground as team manager!

At a national level, the AASA-sanctioned AMRS was also able to continue, although border closures meant the Sydney Motorsport Park, Queensland Raceway and Sandown rounds were predominantly attended by



state-based categories.

The AASA has become a prominent sanctioning body in the off-road scene in recent years and this trend continued in 2020, AORRA (Australian Off Road Racing Association) events such as August's Goondiwindi 400, which was contested by none other than international legend Toby Price.

Price thoroughly enjoyed his participation in the Gundy 400, winning his class and finishing fourth outright.

Another area of recent AASA growth has been in performance events such as burnout competitions and drifting.

The **AASA** was able to sanction the return of drifting to Tasmania through the Drift Tasmania Series, run by the Performance

Driving Australia organisation. The series began in late August and its immediate popularity saw the event organisers running two further rounds, much to the delight of both competitors and spectators.

The AASA-sanctioned Australian Tarmac Rally Championship underwent a change of management in 2020,

long-time organiser Peter Washington and his Mountain Motorsports company handing control of the series to Pam Stables, Brittany Smith and their Australian Tarmac Rally business.

Despite many of the scheduled 2020 events being cancelled, Stables and Smith were able to run the Great Tarmac Rally event in December, setting the scene for a full championship in 2021.

The AASA thanks the positive efforts and enthusiasm of all our Motorsport Venue partners. In particular our growing Speedway partners as well as our Karting event partnerships.

AASA business manager Stephen Whyte acknowledged the team's efforts throughout the year. The direction and support from our BAC Group CEO Chris Lewis-Williams was a most important factor in navi-

gating the COVID-safe management of the business this year," Stephen said.

"I would like to thank not only our small but efficient staff team at AASA, but also our advisory group including our Chairman Bruce Robertson, Chief Steward Gary Gourlay and the Benalla Auto Club committee. "2021 will again be full of challenges but we are in a stronger position than ever to continue offering choice to our motorsport community".

The AASA is most grateful to all our event promoters and competitors for their patience and understanding throughout such a turbulent season. We're also thankful to the many volunteer officials who continue to support our events and ensure our competitors can enjoy the thrill of the action across all different

## Familiar Face of Wakefield Park Celebrates 15 Years

If you've visited Wakefield Park for a race meeting or track day, chances are you've been greeted by the smile of Robyn Ryan, who this month celebrates 15 years of continuous employment at the nation's spectator track.

While there have been several changes in management since 2005, Robyn has been a familiar face at the venue, and has endeared herself to many motorsport competitors with her friendly and helpful demeanour.



Robyn initially worked as a cleaner before transferring into her current office role shortly thereafter.

"When I first started working at Wakefield Park, I just needed a job and I was brought in to help with cleaning, but after a couple of months I started working in the office," Robyn recalled.

"It didn't take me long to realise it was a pretty cool place to work – every day is a new experience and there's always something different happening."

Robyn has seen a lot of evolution during her time at Wakefield Park, but says some things have remained constant.

"There have been improvements to the track, like the concrete wall separating pit lane from the circuit, and the construction of the B-block garages," she said.

"One thing that hasn't changed is the team environment – employees have come and gone over the years but we've always been a close-knit family and we've all helped each other as much as we can."

Wakefield Park has hosted some high-profile events during Robyn's tenure as an employee and she highlighted the second-tier Supercars series (which ran under Konica and Fujitsu branding) as a major attraction.

"The Konica series was a real eye-opener, the scale of community interest and hype was massive," she said.

"These days, the ASBK attracts a similar level of attention and we have other race meetings like the Super Trucks, which always draw big crowds as well."

Robyn said she doesn't necessarily have a favourite Wakefield Park race meeting, with each event having its own point of interest.

"The great thing about Wakefield Park is we have so many different types of events, but all of them attract passionate competitors," she said.

"Some of the historic race meetings are absolutely fantastic, and then there are events like the Wakefield 300 endurance races that are always very exciting.

"You never know who is going to walk through the door either – I've met people like Michael Caton, John Paul Young, Peter Brock and Craig Lowndes."

However, as a passionate supporter of the Sydney Roosters Rugby League team and a fan of country music, Robyn names two drivers as her particular favourites.

"When Jack Elsegood and Adam Brand were racing in the V8 Utes, it was fantastic," she said.

"I was a bit star-struck when I met them for the first time, but they were both really nice guys – very friendly and easy to get along with."

With 15 years under her belt, Robyn is encouraged by the plans for continued improvements to Wakefield Park.

"There have been several management changes since I started working here, but the changes have been for the better overall.

"There are plans in place for some more upgrades, which are very exciting not just for Wakefield Park, but for the Goulburn region – it's such an important part of the local economy."



Robyn's colleagues have congratulated her on reaching the 15-year milestone.

I couldn't be happier to work alongside Robyn," Wakefield Park operations manager Dean Chapman said.

"Our community who visit the raceway always speak highly of Robyn and it is wonderful to see the positive impact she has had not only on our team but also our customers. It has been a pleasure to listen to her wealth of knowledge and all the changes she has witnessed over the last 15 years at the raceway.

"We wish Robyn a very happy 15- year anniversary and with any luck another 15 with us here at Wakefield Park."

"I have worked with Robyn for 7 years and what an amazing asset to Wakefield Park she is – always supportive, loyal and there to lend a helping hand when needed," Benalla Auto Club Group administration manager Glenys Collins said.

"She's not one to make a fuss, she just puts her head down and gets on with the job at hand, taking all changes in her stride. Congratulations on 15 years' service Robyn and thank you for your help and support over the years."





Parker is a kind hearted, cheeky and strong willed lad who loves lego, cars and all things machinery . He also has cancer....

From when Parker was born he has suffered in pain and has been restricted as to what he can do, and what other kids his age take for granted.

Parker has been in and out of hospital all of his life, including several attempts of chemotherapy, all of which have been unsuccessful.



He has always had though, the support of his his dad Ross, mother Mel and younger sister Ava and friends.

## Sargent Survives Setback to Clinch Formula Ford Title

Young racer Tom Sargent has survived a controversial collision to seal the NSW Formula Ford Championship in a tense title decider,

held as part of the fifth and final Motorsport Australia NSW Motor Race Championship meeting at Wakefield Park on the weekend.

After qualifying on pole position, Sargent finished second behind Cody Burcher in Race 1 before the two drivers collided while battling for the lead in Race 2. Sargent's Formula Ford sustained tyre damage but he was able to nurse his car to the finish, earning him classification in the results and scoring him enough points to clinch the title with a race remaining.

Sargent charged from the rear of the field to fourth in Race 3 – the trophy race – which was won by his CHE Racing team-mate Noah Sands ahead of Zach Bates and Burcher.

Another driver to suffer an anxious moment while trying to win a championship was Glenn Deering in the HQ Holdens. Deering finished a solid sixth in Race 1, but a differential problem in Race 2 saw him falling to 11<sup>th</sup>. A hasty diff replacement enabled Deering to return to the circuit for Race 3; seventh place was enough for him to win the championship by just a handful of points over David Proglio.

The round win went to Brett Osborn, who won all three races and set a new lap record in the process; John Baxter was second ahead of Matt Barker.

Nick Kelly (Radical SR8) won Races 1 and 3 in Supersports but it was fellow SR8 driver Peter White who emerged victorious in Race 2 after a brave move around the outside of Kelly on a damp track.

Despite chalking up a DNF in Race 1 due to a first-lap tangle, Steve Champion (Radical SR3) was able to win back-to-back titles, albeit by just two points over Kelly in the final standings.

A round win for Ryan Gorton was enough for the circuit racing debutant and former speedway racer to win the Mazda RX8 Cup title; Steve Devjak was second for the round ahead of Justin Barnes. The nastiest incident of the weekend occurred in Race 2, when Andrew O'Keefe lost control of his RX8 and ploughed into the side of Jake Lougher, in turn causing Lougher to make heavy contact with the wall at Turn 2.

Grant Doulman won the NSW Sports Sedan trophy race ahead of Mark Duggan and Stuart Inwood after the Fiat of Brad Shiels, which won Races 1 and 2, retired with mechanical problems in Race 3.

Laurence Katsidis won the first Formula Race Cars race before Greg Muddle won Races 2 and 3, while the Formula Vee race wins were shared between Daniel Reynolds and Simon Pace.

In Production Sports, David Wall (Porsche Carrera Cup car) and Nick Kelly (Audi R8) staged an epic battle in Race 1, the two cars racing nose-to-tail for the entire 30 minutes with Wall ultimately prevailing. The former Carrera Cup champion was able to win by a more comfortable margin in Race 2, while the championship went to the Class B entry of Adrian Wilson/Andre Nader.

The race meeting, which was Wakefield Park's final major event for 2020, attracted the largest turnout of officials in history, with more than 50 dedicated volunteers attending the circuit to fulfil duties in race control, pit lane, flag marshalling, scrutineering, fire, rescue and recovery.

An end-of-season awards function for the officials was held on Saturday evening, with Glenn Nichols receiving the Official of the Year Award, Tayla Flannery being crowned the Most Improved Official, Kate Epplestun being recognised as the Officials' Favourite Official and David Trotter receiving the Foxy 1 Award.

## SEK NSW Lithgow 7 Hour - Race Report



2020 may have been a tough year for many people, but one person who hasn't stopped smiling is Wakefield Park race official Kate Eppelstun.

If you've raced at Wakefield Park, there is no doubt you will recognise Kate and you will have benefited from her pure passion for motorsport and thorough organisational abilities.

Starting as a flag marshal at the Gold Coast Supercars event more than 13 years ago, Kate has officiated at some of the highest-profile race meetings in the country but she still calls Wakefield Park home.

Kate has been enjoying her newly-acquired skills in race control.

"I've been finding it interesting and learning some new skills," she said.

"It's awesome to have people like Jess (Nicholson) and Nick (Goring) to learn from."

While Kate said 2020 produced plenty of highlights, she singled out the final Motorsport Australia NSW State round as her favourite moment.

"Jess, Nick and I have worked hard for many years on recruiting officials and at the MA NSW State round, we achieved our goal of having every flag point manned, a full crew in race control and a full crew in the pits," she said.

"It was an awesome weekend and just to top it off, I was fortunate enough to receive the Officials' Favourite Offi-

#### cial Award, which was a real honour.

"Everyone in the Wakefield Park officials team gets on famously - we're like a big family. The circuit management, especially Dean and James, are fantastic as well. They give us everything we ask for and go out of our way to make sure we're comfortable."

Jess Nicholson, who has worked as Clerk of Course for many Wakefield Park events, said Kate's best qualities are her dedication and knowledge.

"I've worked with Kate since 2014 and I've always found her to be so dedicated, open and approachable," Jess said.

"She's been a valued member of the team as the chief flag marshal, but more recently she's been working in race control and doing a fantastic job - she certainly knows her way around the track and has a thorough understanding of the regulations for running a race meeting."

Wakefield Park manager Dean Chapman said Kate's contributions are valued by not only the other officials, but also the competitors.

## NATIONAL GRAVEL RALLY LICENCE

A National Gravel Rally Licence is used to compete n gravel rally events. It cannot be used to compete in tarmac rally events.

## GRAVEL RALLY NAVIGATOR LICENCE

Navigators sit alongside drivers in rally events. The Gravel Rally Navigator Licence does not entitle the holder to drive a vehicle during gravel rally events.

## NATIONAL SPEEDWAY LICENCE

A National Speedway Licence can be used at all AASA-sanctioned speedway events.

## NATIONAL KARTING LICENCE

A National Karting Licence can be used at all AASA saunctioned Kart Racing Events.

## CLUB KARTING LICENCE

This licence can be used at Kart Practice Events only. This does include Junior Karting and is only appropriate for AASA sanctioned Karting classes which allow persons in this age range to participate. Juniors must be aged between 6 and 14 years of age, applications must be accompanied by the written consent of the minors parent or guardian for the minor to hold ths licence.

## WHAT LICENCE DO I NEED?



## CLUB LICENCE

Valid for AASA sanctioned drive days, test and tune days, regularity, lap dash/sprint events, touring road events, drift events, motorkhanas/autokahanas, hill climbs, rally sprints & regularities.

## NATIONAL RACE LICENCE

A racing competition licence and is the only licence which can be used to compete in racing events held within a race meeting.

## EXTREME EVENT LICENCE

This licence is used to participate in extreme events such as burnouts, go-to-whoa, drag racing (specified events only, straight line sprint, tractor pull and other events which specify an AASA Extreme Event Licence.

## NATIONAL TARMAC RALLY LICENCE

A National Tarmac Rally Licence is used to compete in Tarmac or Gravel Rally events. Applicants must hold a current drive's licence and provide details of previous experience.

## TARMAC NAVIGATOR LICENCE

This licence will provide the Navigator to sit alongside drivers in rally events. This licence can be used at both Gravel & tarmac Rally events but does not entitle the holder to drive a vehicle during rally events, you will need a National Tarmac & Gravel Rally Licence if you wish to drive also.
